TED TURNER launched the first news network – imagine that.

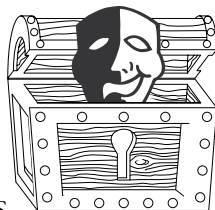
MICHELLE KWAN, the future ice skating champion, was born.

**BOY SCOUTS CELEBRATE
100 YEARS**

As the Boy Scouts of America get ready to celebrate 100 years of Scouting the relationship between Lions Clubs International and Boy Scouts continue. The Lions have a solid association that dates back to the early days of Scouting.

In the United States today, Lions clubs sponsor more Scout troops than any other non-religious organization. As of January 11, 2005, U.S. Lions sponsored more than 2,879 Boy Scout units which included, 83,779 Scouts.

The cooperation that exists between Scouts and Lions benefits both organizations. Young people (such as Scouts) need the guidance and mentoring of quality adult role models (Lions). When Lions Clubs charter a Scouts unit, they provide Scouts with adult role models. In addition, the chartering of a Scout unit provides a quality program for the youth of the community.

As the Boy Scouts mark this exciting time they have many events planned during this year and a half celebration. During this time the scouts of Connecticut Rivers Council will perform a state wide service project, participate in National events including the National Jamboree and hold a Council Jamboree at the Hebron Lions fairgrounds where they expect 10,000 Scouts and leaders to encamp for the weekend. This event will be held June 4 – 6, 2010. At this event they hope to collect 10,000 pairs of eyeglasses for Lions International.


The Connecticut Rivers Council has asked us to support them in this outstanding event that will be chaired by Hebron Lion Adam Miclette. Please look for a future mailing to you club with more information.

This is a good time for your club to partner up with a scout unit to do a local service project. Lions clubs can present the Lions Clubs-Boy Scouts of America Community Service Award to Scouts who participate in joint Lions/Scouts service projects.

Lions clubs that sponsor a BSA Unit can receive the Lions Boy Scout banner patch award. Make sure if you sponsor a unit that show your patch

A Lions certificate is available for presentation to young men who have attained the highest US Boy Scout rank - the Eagle Scout. Scout leaders may contact their local Lions club and request the suitable-for-framing certificate. An award certificate and a letter from international headquarters will be sent to your club for formal presentation to the Eagle Scout. Make sure that you troops in your area are aware of this award.

DEAR FELLOW LIONS OF DISTRICT 23-C:

District Governor Armand LaFleur has asked me to write about the Lions Low Vision Center of Eastern Connecticut for this issue of the Lions Tale.

During the past year, the number of client visits made by our low vision technician Carol Dykas have increased, while donations from Lions Clubs decreased by \$6,000.00 from 2007-2008, and because the year is not over yet, we are not sure at what level club donations will be this year. These are difficult economic times, but I beg you to please remember us, too.

Our Lion Low Vision Center is a district 23-C, eastern-Connecticut-ONLY charity. So often, I hear Lions complaining that they want to raise monies for their communities and not have it go to other parts of the country or other parts of the world. Making donations to our district's Low Vision Center helps all of our eastern Connecticut communities. People in your own backyard are being helped and many Lions may not even be aware of it!

Therefore, I am writing this to let you know how many people have been served by the Low Vision Center, what towns they live in and how much money has been spent.

From March of 2008 to March of 2009, our low vision technician visited people in the following towns who received help from the Lions Low Vision Center of Eastern Connecticut. See if your town is on the list. Amston, Andover, Brooklyn, Centerbrook, Clinton, Colchester, Coventry, Cromwell, Danielson, Dayville, Deep River, Durham, East Haddam, East Hampton, East Lyme, Eastford, Ellington, Essex, Gales Ferry, Groton, Jewett City, Lebanon, Ledyard, Lisbon, Mansfield, Middletown, Moodus, Moosup, Mystic, North Windham, New London, Niantic, Noank, Norwich, Oakdale, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, Oneco, Pawcatuck, Portland, Preston, Putnam, Quaker Hill, Salem, South Killingly, South Lyme, Stafford, Storrs, Taftville, Tolland, Vernon, Waterford, Westbrook, Willimantic, Willington, Windham, and Woodstock.

The 518 people were seen and given \$23,290.00 dollars worth of low vision aids with our technician's time costing \$30,000 to drive to their towns, and then to evaluate them to determine what devices would help them, and then show the people how to use them.

Our technician, Carol Dykas is a licensed optician with a specialty in low vision. She is not a Lion, and works as a paid contractor for the low vision center. She verifies that the people she sees have visited an optometrist or ophthalmologist, and makes sure that the help we give complements the care the doctor recommends. A local eye doctor told us that if a person with low vision were to have to pay out of pocket for low vision help similar to what the Lions provide, it would cost each individual \$400.00 each. We are providing this service for free to the people of eastern Connecticut and for only

about a quarter of the cost per person.

As one of the members of the Low Vision Board has said, "Enhancing vision, enhances a person's life." Imagine if you were not able to read such things as the label on prescription medication, price tags on items in the store, the print in the newspaper, a menu in a restaurant, the figures in your checkbook... and the list goes on. How would you feel if you couldn't watch television, go bird watching, see your grandchild's face in a photograph that has been mailed to you?

We Lions help people with low vision to live more independently - and we enhance their lives. The Lions of District 23C who support the low vision center should be proud of their role in making the world a better world place for people with low vision.

Won't you please continue to help us - and perhaps add a little to your budget for us next year? The Lions Low Vision Center of Eastern Connecticut is a 501c3 charitable corporation and is eligible for matching funds from businesses such as Pfizer, Traveler's, etc. We also have a link to accepting donations made using Pay Pal on our website: www.lionslowvision.com

I am so grateful to the clubs and individual Lions who have helped us with donations this year. Some of you bought our tickets, or signed up for the golf tournament run by a hardworking committee of Lions dedicated to low vision. We, again, want to acknowledge the memorial donations made in honor of Lions Past District Governor and Council Chairman Ted Coolidge who passed away - he has truly been our "angel" this year! In addition, we look forward to helping your neighbors (and possibly even you) someday in the future.
